Quilt batting update

For some years, we have been able to get batting from The Warm Company at little or no cost. This is no longer the case, which means that batting costs are now a significant expense for the chapter. We will continue to provide batting, but probably on a more limited basis, so any help in this area will be appreciated. We frequently join remnant pieces together, so please be frugal and respectful of this resource.



Making Blankets for Project Linus

Thank you for being a blanketeer for Project Linus. All of your donations will be given to local children (infants through teens) that are critically ill, traumatized or otherwise in need. Here are some tips to help you get started.

Blankets must be new, clean and washable. Choose colors and prints that are child or teen friendly. Keep in mind that they're given to boys and girls so it's good to have a mix of masculine, feminine and gender-neutral prints and colors.

Blankets may be tied, crocheted, quilted, knitted or sewn. Camps often prefer tied fleece blankets but donations go to many organizations outside of hospitals. Free patterns are available at www.ProjectLinus.org or on <u>our website</u>. There are no size requirements. Bigger is usually better. Small children can grow into a large blanket, but can quickly grow out of a small one.

Choose cuddly, soft and machine washable/dryable materials: all-cotton fabric and flannel; fleece and acrylic yarn. Please do not use denim, tapestry, polyester double knit, felt, vinyl, wool, corduroy or wool yarn. Trim off ALL the selvages.

Batting should be securely sewn into outer seams of quilts. Please sew and store the blankets in smokeand pet hair-free environments. These cause allergic reactions in some children and cannot be used.

When making tied fleece blankets:

- Fringe should be no longer than 3 inches, no wider than 1 inch. Longer, wider fringes become a choking hazard for small children and can get tangled in IV lines. Blankets look nicer if all the strips are about the same size.
- Please be sure to trim the selvage to give the blanket a neat, polished finish. This is the finished edge of fabric, often where the designer and company names are printed.
- Tie knots securely but not so tight that the blanket bunches or pulls.

If you have any questions about blanket construction, quilting or tying, binding, etc., do not hesitate to ask! We are happy to help you learn better quilting techniques!! We also have expert knitters and crocheters, who are happy to teach, guide, or help you with a specific problem etc.
